

A NOTE FROM PASTOR JULIE

Scripture Focus: John 20:1, 11-16

Later this month we celebrate Easter. The resurrection of Jesus the very first Easter morning gives us hope that death does not have the final say. Through Jesus' victory over death, we have hope of eternal life.

I remember the first Easter I lived in Nome, Alaska as a US-2 Young Adult Missionary through the United Methodist Church. I had lived in Nome a little over six months and had *nearly* made it through my first winter. As I woke up that morning, I was in a crummy mood. The sky was gray and overcast. Snow that had been accumulating since October was still on the ground. Green grass and flowers were absent from the landscape. Signs of Easter as I had known them for the first 24 years of my life were absent. The cues were not there to convince my mind and body that it was Easter. I just wanted to stay in bed.

My feelings that day gave me a tiny glimpse into what Mary Magdalene must have been feeling the very first Easter morning. Her beloved teacher and friend had been crucified and laid to rest in a tomb. She was grieving and perhaps felt hopeless in her grief. Life as she knew it was over as she struggled to relearn the world without Jesus in it. She returned to the tomb after telling Peter and the other disciple that Jesus' body was gone. Upon her return, Mary Magdalene encountered a man whom she thought was the gardener and asked where he had taken Jesus' body. In that moment Jesus revealed himself to her and immediately she recognized him. Hope was restored!

What at first seemed like a hopeless, gloomy Easter day for me several years ago turned into several encounters of the risen Christ. I experienced the risen Christ through worship – the songs, prayers, Easter story, sermon, and the people around me. I experienced the risen Christ through the gift of homemade hot cross buns from a woman in the church. I experienced the risen Christ in the people who hosted me and other friends for Easter dinner later that afternoon. The risen Christ showed up through the love and thoughtfulness of others, as I relearned what Easter is like in another part of the country. Easter is not about the external signs I was used to. Easter is about the fact that Christ is alive! Christ is alive indeed!

Sometimes the risen Christ may be hard to see at first, but he is there! Just when we think all hope is lost, Christ shows up. How will the risen Christ show up for you this Easter?

CROSSINGS



Pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists all encounter some form of sign indicating a crossing ahead. There are deer, pedestrian, railroad, school, truck and other crossing signs giving us non-verbal directions. More populated areas include sound warning signals at crosswalks for the visually impaired. Some of these non-verbal directions bring our attention to reduce speed, yield the right of way, and take extra caution in observing for people.

"Obedience brings great rewards." Jeremiah 7:23

Obeying the rules of the road signs helps keep people safe.

As Easter Sunday/Resurrection Day arrives on April 20 this year, I want to bring our attention to *John 19:25-27*.

"Standing near the cross were Jesus' mother, and his mother's sister, Mary, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother standing there beside the disciple he loved, he said to her, 'Woman, he is your son.' And he said to this disciple, 'She is your mother.' And from then on this disciple took her into his home."

The other Gospels, Matthew, Mark, and Luke, use the word <u>distance</u> and <u>bystanders</u> describing the scene around Jesus' crucifixion. In John 19, it is recorded that there is just one disciple Jesus sees at the cross; it's the disciple whom He loved.

Let's back up a couple of weeks ago to a radio program sermon I heard on this particular John text. The speaker brings attention to the fact that there was only one disciple who showed up at the cross. The others would be included in that distant or bystander setting. This speaker then brings up a question to listeners. How would you feel if only one person came to you as you were dying? What if you made that difference in someone's life? What if you stood at the cross (and) wanted to be that disciple whom he loved? I'm certain that Jesus would welcome you with open arms in thought and spirit. I'm certain you would welcome someone who comes to your side.

"For the Lord our God is the one who rescued us..." Joshua 24:17

In three weeks, we celebrate the <u>life</u> of Christ again. Even with uncertainties, doubt, or fears we can be recognized by Jesus and others as the disciple whom he loved, when we move toward the sign of the Cross.

"For God knew his people in advance, and he chose them... and having chosen them, he called them to come to him." Romans 8:29-30

So when we are approaching one of those crossing signs, remember... reduce speed, yield to Him right away, and take extra caution in observing for people.

But now you have turned to your Shepherd, the Guardian of your souls." I Peter 2:25
