# **Spindle**

Several months ago, a conversation with a co-worker turned to his family tradition of spinning fibers into yarn. He was exited to know I could supply a wool fleece for home-spun yarn.



Typically, once the sheep are sheared in the spring, the wool is put into a large burlap bag and taken to a wool buyer. From the wool buyer, it is sent to a wool manufacturer for processing.

I did a little more digging into the 'how-to' of making wool into yarn. Seems there is revitalized interest in spinning your own fibers. It gives you the choice of adding a variety of colors to your project, or keeping the fibers as natural as possible. This old born again, long tradition is said to be very gratifying. Ah, but getting there plays an important role in the finished work.

"God has given each of us the ability to do certain things well." Romans 12:6

You have to prepare this raw wool by cleaning, carding and spinning before utilizing a fiber product to weave or knit.

There's the 'picking' through the wool to remove any unwanted materials, such as hay or straw. <u>Cleaning</u> is important and processed carefully and gently to stay as fibers. It must be washed in hot water at temperatures of 140F, then rinsed in cool water. It may require 2 or 3 washings to remove the lanolin and other impurities. Too much agitation could result in tangling and then felt (unusable for spinning)!

Still more preparation with 'carding' the wool. These tools used are similar to wire brushes. A back-and-forth motion over these 'combs' helps remove any remaining grit.

As rewarding as this is for many new traditionalists, there's still a few more steps for wool to become yarn. After the wool is cleaned, dried and fluffed, it is cut into strips called 'rovings'. These are then wound around large wooden spools for spinning.

"If it seems slow, wait, for it will surely take place." Habakkuk 2:3

Well, almost there to that spinning process. Those roves are now twisted through the Master's fingers into one long thread. The tasks are all do-able, yet time is needed for each and every step along the way. The Master spins, bonding the fibers together, creating a much more useful product from such a raw beginning.

"I wait patiently for the Lord to help me, and he turned to me..." Psalm 40:1

Sometimes we can be in any one or more processes of wool to yarn. We might be a single process for someone else learning/yearning to weave or be woven. We may be at the process that needs the Master's hand in preparing a fine fiber for further use. Whenever we seek the 'how-to' and process, know the Master's hand will lead.

"And may you... understand, as all God's people should, how wide, how long, how high, and how deep his love really is." Ephesians 3:18-20

### UPDATE ON SOUND SYSTEM

### We're Making Progress toward a New Sound System

Following two worship services in July, Rev. Julie Yoder Elmore presented the plans for a new sound system that will positively affect the ministries of the Litchfield United Methodist Church. A PowerPoint presentation illustrated the needs, and good discussion followed. Those in attendance took a summary and pledge card home to pray about their involvement. Approximately \$18,000 is needed for the total package; however, the church can purchase equipment in phases, if necessary, as indicated below:



Phase 1 -- \$7,247.98

Phase 2 -- \$5,810.00

Phase 3 -- \$3,045.82

Labor Costs -- \$1,529.96

Total -- \$17,633.76

As of July 27, cash gifts and pledges total \$6,480 for the sound system project, which includes a generous grant from the George White Funeral Home. We have already achieved 37 percent of the goal which is an excellent beginning. We deeply appreciate your support.

For those who are still considering their involvement, please remember that we ask that gifts be made **above and beyond** our regular tithes and offerings, as the operations of our church must go forward, as well. Additional proposals will be delivered and information letters about the project will be mailed in August and September.
