

A NOTE FROM PASTOR JULIE

What are you giving up for Lent this year? Maybe chocolate? May an activity that distracts you from your relationship with God? Why give up something for Lent at all?

Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Easter Sunday, is a time for us as individuals to intentionally examine and reflect upon what is distracting us from a deeper relationship with God. This year the season of Lent begins on March 5 and ends on April 20. Whether we add something positive to our lives or give something up for Lent, we have the opportunity to experience God in new and fresh ways.

Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21 focuses on three spiritual disciplines that help us to deepen our relationship with God. These are giving to the poor, prayer, and fasting. When we participate in these spiritual disciplines, we are not to do them just to look good to others, but to do them with our hearts focused on God. In this passage, Jesus also says that we are to build up our treasures in heaven. In other words, we are to focus on those things that last beyond this world, which are those things that are important to God.

Giving to the poor is not just about giving money, but is also about what Jesus talks about in Matthew 25 when we do for the least of these, it is as if we are doing for Jesus. If we are intentional, we can better see Jesus in the eyes of those we serve. Through prayer we deepen our relationship with God as we bring our concerns, joys, praises, and thanksgiving to God. Fasting is giving something up such as a meal, a particular food that we love so much, or a specific activity. As we feel the pangs of hunger or find ourselves missing that favorite food or activity, we can use those opportunities to focus on God and to recognize our deep need for God. All that we have comes from God including our salvation. We cannot overcome our sins on our own; we need God's grace to save us.

What will you add or subtract from your life this Lenten season in order to deepen your relationship with God?



When reading, there are times a symbol is at the end of a word or phrase. We've seen them before and have been taught to refer to a key or bottom of the page for a description of the meaning. In this reference we discover a definition for a clearer and better understanding of a word being used in the sentence and content. Sometimes these words are so disruptive in our thinking that a further definition is necessary to realize the writers intent.



Are there words for you that cause interruption in knowing a true meaning? The month of March has a few words worth time and attention. The word Lent (not lint—a fuzzy in the bottom of a pocket) or Lenten can take up several pages to describe origin and meaning. We will leave that one for another time to explore, but we know it marks a religious season leading to Easter.

So in my reading I find the word Easter was actually tied to pagan worship centuries ago. 'Recent' centuries have reshaped that word and meaning into a Christian recognition of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Our Easter word comes from Eostre/Ostara—Norse Anglo-Saxon origin, referring to the goddess of

spring. Through my continued search of origin and meaning, I found that definition to tie into Christ-renewal of life. This was a pagan festival, celebrated in the spring! As the early Christians continued to spread Christ's new message to non-believers, they redefined Eostre to recognize Jesus Christ as new life.

This gradual deceptive word association seems to have changed to a discernment of the sort. Now here's a word that can leave one with that (?) question mark symbol over your thinking cap.

More searching of discern.

- to understand something not immediately obvious
- distinguish; to be able to tell the difference between two or more things
- to recognize

It's that ah-hah moment in word association/recognition *

"They searched the Scriptures day after day to check up on Paul and Silas to see if they were really teaching the truth." Acts 17:11b

* - there's that symbol that wants <u>you</u> to look into these meanings of words for a better understanding.

The United Methodist Hymnal (1989 copyright) has 30 pages set aside in words and music referring to the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. We often call it Easter. One minister I know only refers to the Sunday following Good Friday as Resurrection Sunday, leaving that Easter word to an ancient pagan festival. So, how do we decide and know this Easter season?

A line from Hymn 304—"When in trouble move the faster to our God who rights the wrong". With just a slight letter change we get—When in trouble move to Easter to our God who rights the wrong. A new meaning for an old line.

Still another word from one of those 30 pages leading to his Resurrection—tarry. Hymn 314, a definition of tarry from Webster's Collegiate Dictionary—linger in expectation.

This season of Lent is leading us to Resurrection Sunday—Easter. *

- Imagine No Malaria: A United Methodist Church effort to raise \$75 million to eliminate death and suffering from malaria in Africa by 2015.
