

A NOTE FROM PASTOR JULIE

Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen Indeed! Last month we celebrated the resurrection of Jesus Christ as we celebrated Easter. There is hope in the story of the resurrection of Jesus. Jesus died and overcame death through his resurrection!

John 20:1-18 gives one account of the resurrection story. The tomb is empty and Mary Magdalene (a disciple in her own right) is the first to discover this and goes to tell other disciples – Peter and the beloved disciple (who many think was John). They find that Mary is right and that the tomb is indeed empty. When Mary first sees the empty tomb, she thinks some people have taken Jesus away. John believes that the tomb is empty and that death has been defeated, but does not understand about the resurrection. Peter saw that the tomb was empty, as well, and that the linen wrappings were just lying there.

Both Peter and John return home, while Mary stays near the tomb and weeps. She weeps to the angels in the tomb that "they have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." As she turns around, she sees who she thinks is a gardener. It is not until he says her name that she realizes who is really in front of her. In front of her is her teacher, her Lord. Jesus tells her not to hold on to him because he has not yet ascended to the Father. He still has much work to do before he goes to be with God. In telling Mary not to hold on to him, he is telling Mary to share the good news that he is risen.

Why was Mary the first person to see the Risen Jesus? Why did the disciples run home? Did they think that because the tomb was empty that they would never see Christ again and that was the end of the story? Were they not listening to Jesus when he told them that after he was going to die, that he would rise again on the third day?

Mary faithfully stayed by the tomb and was the first to discover the good news. We, like Mary, should not keep this news to ourselves, for Christ is Risen and has overcome death once and for all. This is good news for us because we have hope that one day we too will be resurrected with Christ and have new life in Christ. Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen indeed!

MAY I HAVE THIS DANCE?

Do you remember learning about the Maypole? A day celebrated on or around May 1. This festive time is centuries old and observed mostly in European countries. Some of my findings reveal it had pagan connections dating back to a time before Christ. A time of worship by Romans to Flora*, the goddess of flowers. Another group of people, from the British Isles, the Druids, celebrated a new year on May 1, May Day for them. As people of long ago invade, conquer and occupy other lands, a blending of cultures becomes at risk for change.

"It is time to celebrate before the Lord your God... with your whole family.

This festival will be a time of great joy for all." Deuteronomy 16:9-15

The church recently celebrated Resurrection Sunday or Easter, another once-pagan festival (March '14 newsletter), with the hope for a newness of life in Jesus Christ. Somehow, some mysterious way, these celebrations began without God, but have twisted, turned, and evolved into new life inclusive of His creations.



The Maypole celebrations include song, dance, brightly colored ribbons, garlands of flowers, and much joy. A time to renew and refresh the spirit as spring leads way to summer. A similar time from Easter leading to Pentecost (seven weeks after Jesus' resurrection, Acts 2:1). A time for newness of life to a newness of spirit.

The Maypole celebrations had hardships as well, throughout those many centuries in Europe. There was opposition to worship a goddess, but continued to include new life and eventually tied to Pentecost celebrating a resurrected spirit. Even as we have much joy because of Easter and the risen Lord, we need a spirit to help us continue with that great act of life renewed. We too will have challenges, doubts, and questions in life for the why's, how's and when?

"And everyone present was filled with the Holy Spirit." Acts 2:4

Jesus said, "But when my Father sends the Counselor as my representative-the Holy Spirit-he will teach you everything and will remind you of everything I myself have told you." John 14:26

That innermost Spirit will help us be patient, discover and find some peace.

In all the information I read about the Maypole, there were some common traits century after century. The day in May brought people together, the awareness of new life, and a renewed joy that a spirit is within them.

"Come, everyone, and clap your hands for joy! Shout to God with joyful praise!" Psalm 47:1

The festival of the Maypole has changed in many ways. It has even transformed to include the Christian celebration of Pentecost (June 8, this year). Be open to a renewed spirit in Christ. Let the season of Easter continue in May with a change of spirit in us for a new song and dance to God.
