A Note From Pastor Julie

Scripture Reference: Mark 6:30-32

It's September already and we all know what that means...the beginning of a new school year. If you or your student have not begun classes yet, the day is coming soon. The beginning of a new school year means a flurry of activities. The busyness of it all can be exciting and rewarding, yet at the same time overwhelming and draining if we are not careful. Where is the time to get centered in the midst of all this activity??

The disciples were also very busy people in their day. Jesus had sent them out two by two to various communities to teach, heal and cast out demons. Although they were very excited about what they were doing, the disciples became drained of their energy over time; some were too busy to eat! When they had all gathered to report back to Jesus about their missions, I can imagine they were all talking a mile a minute about their experiences - the good, the bad and the ugly. After hearing them, Jesus called them to go with him to a deserted place so that they could have a time of Sabbath rest and eat together.

In the midst of our busy days, it is important to take time for Sabbath rest and reconnection with God. It is easy to go and go and go and push and push and push and sooner or later we find ourselves burned out by all the demands of our days. It is not easy, but taking time away with God helps to fill us up and refreshes us. Ideally, we would dedicate a whole day to spending time with God and getting renewed. As many of us know, this is not always possible, as would be confirmed if we read further in Mark 6:33-42. People have needs — our kids, our grandkids, our family, our friends, and our community. Yet still in the midst of these interruptions, God calls us away to a deserted place. This time away could be when we first wake up in the morning, at noon over lunch, or in the evening as our day is winding down.

May you find time in this busy season of the year to connect with God and be refreshed anew to do all that God calls you to do.

What a great year we've had!! Our Free Summer Lunch Program was very successful again this year. We served 633 meals to children over a 17-day period. We had 5 fewer serving days this year due to school being let out a week later, a day without power, and the July 4th holiday which fell on a Friday. We averaged 37 children per day. We had numerous donations, both food and monetary. We'd like to extend a very sincere Thank You to all of those who volunteered to prepare and serve the meals, those who helped with the children, and to all who donated their money, food, time, energy, and love into helping to provide meals to our community's children this year. *You are All so very much Appreciated!!*

Sweet Corn Days Bake Sale

We had a terrific bake sale this year as well. Many members donated a wide variety of delectable baked goods and we had our corn-cob and candy corn crispy treats again. We raised \$583.76 for the **Imagine No Malaria** campaign through the United Methodist Church fundraiser. Because of our Community and Church efforts and resources, more people will be educated about Malaria and how it can be treated. This horrible disease kills many women and children each year in Africa.

We made a commitment of \$400.00 and surpassed that. All the monies will be sent to this cause. Again, we'd like to say Thank You to all the bakers, set-up and take-down crews, and workers who gave their time, energy and baking talents into making this year another great success!

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BEETS

The produce stands are filled with a variety of vegetables this time of year. There is such an abundance of veggies and something for everyone's taste buds. The variety of flavors and textures clearly outnumbers the menus at most restaurants and eateries. There's the



mainstream foods with corn, asparagus, potatoes, and buns. Variety is still available. It still exists!

Gardens can produce and do produce that variety of veggies that are sometimes missing from mainstream menus. Green and yellow beans grow in similar soils within a couple feet of each other. Eggplants flourish in the same garden with the right amount of space and water. Slide over a few more feet and sweet corn towers over sweet peas and green peppers. Gooseneck yellow squash and red tomatoes in a variety of shapes, sizes, and textures all grow in the same garden.

Some people have shared with me their love of the garden flavors. Pickled beets seem to be a popular choice for a few people. I can still remember my mom's kitchen when she cooked beets. There was always a variety in her menu planning, compared to the mainstream menus at many eateries today.

"Let there be harmony... united in thought and purpose..." I Corinthians 1:12-13

Today, we can still find a variety. We find it at produce stands and even more importantly in our community of people. We find that variety of people with welders, mechanics, bakers, designers, seamsters, producers, caretakers, and more. All these people come together in one big garden. Different flavors meeting the taste-bud needs for a variety of people.

Tomatoes are high acidic vegetables (fruit), and beets are low acidic vegetables. Yet they can help fill a produce stand and feed people. We, too, can be a part of meeting, greeting, and filling the needs of people in a variety of ways. There's the energetic encouraging type of people to the low-keyed get-r-done folk!

So as the garden vegetable varieties come together adding flavor, color, texture, and nutrients that sustain people and lives, we, too, in our various lives can bring the good news of Jesus Christ and God to a community and people.

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Gangway to Galilee: Amazing Grace Adventures

From August 3 to 7, our church was transformed with boats, kayaks, fishing equipment, a wooden dock, water toys, sea shells, and sea gulls. Children from age three to eighth grade acted out stories about Jesus' life on and around the Sea of Galilee, sang new songs, learned verses and how to use their Bibles, ate snacks, made crafts, and played a variety of water games.

Fifty-eight children participated during the week, 20 of whom came every night plus another 12 who attended four nights. High attendance of 44 children (including 16 pre-school and kindergarteners) was recorded on Thursday night. Each night throughout the week, about 28 adults and teens made all aspects of the program run smoothly. What a fun time the children had! I heard the adults enjoyed being kids again, too.

For this year's missions emphasis, children brought offerings to support the clean water projects in Africa that are sponsored by the United Methodist Church. A spirited competition took place between the girls (with their team captain, Pastor Julie) and the boys (with their team captain, Tim Chilson).

During the closing night program, which was attended by about 20 additional family members, the announcement of the team that had contributed the most was made. This year, the girls mightily defeated the boys, which resulted in a cold water bath for Tim. Pastor Julie was so excited with the gift total of \$569.62 that she, too, asked for a water-dunking, which Scottie Steele was happy to provide. Following ice cream sundaes and time to meet the parents, each family received a CD/DVD of the songs and memory verses to take home.

Thank you to all who helped to make this exciting week of ministry possible. Please pray for these wonderful children that they will continue to grow and serve God throughout their lives. We already look forward to next year when we can partner again with the Congregational Church to conduct VBS in Litchfield. God is good!



People in our community continue to struggle every day to pay their bills and put food on their tables. Some are even forced to choose between the two, a heartbreaking decision that no one should have to make.


The Mission has been chosen to join forces with Meijer and their "Simply Give" food pantry donation campaign to help fill that void for local families and the homeless.

Simply Give helps nearly 200 food pantries in Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, and Kentucky keep their shelves stocked with food for those in need. But it also fosters a sense of community by encouraging customers to purchase "\$10 Meijer Food Pantry Donation Cards", now through September 27, available at checkout lanes. Each \$10 card is matched by Meijer, so your donation turns into \$20, then they are given to the Mission to stock the pantries. You can also pick up a card in the Narthex at church and take it to Meijer when you shop and donate \$10 or more to our local food pantry here in Litchfield.
